Scrapping of B-1 bomber criticized

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The chairman of the House Armed Services Committee said Thursday President Carter seems to have given the Soviets something for nothing in killing the B-1 bomber program.

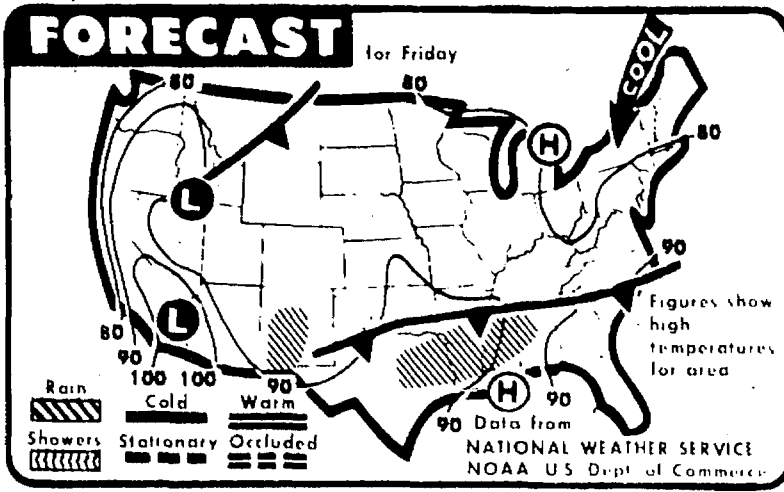
Rep. Melvin Price (D-Ill.) also said Congress would be unable to complete action on Carter's request for cruise missile development funds before the month-long summer recess starts Aug. 6. Carter wants to develop the cruise missile as a substitute for the B-1.

"I do not like to overstate the case and I would not agree with those who say we are practicing unilateral disarmament," Price said of Carter's decision to scrap the costly B-1 and rely on the pilotless cruise missiles instead.

"But certainly it can be said that the United States is practicing unilateral arms restraint. It is rare indeed when any nation foregoes the development of the most advanced weapons it is capable of producing.

Price noted that U.S. arms control experts had suggested the Soviets should respond to the B-1 decision by curtailing some arms program of their own.

"If there has been any arms restraint by the Soviet Union, I am unaware of it," he said.

Hijackers get 30-year terms

NEW YORK (AP) — The remaining three members of the Croatian extremist band that hijacked a Trans World Airlines jetliner last September were sentenced Thursday, each receiving a 30-year term.

The leader of the group and his American wife were sentenced Wednesday to life in prison.

Federal Judge John Bartels ruled that the leader, Zvonko Basic, 28, must serve a minimum of 10 years before becoming eligible for parole, and his wife, Julienne, also 28, must serve eight years.

Basic and his wife were convicted in May of air piracy that resulted in the death of police officer Brian Murray, who was killed trying to defuse a bomb left by the hijackers in a locker in Grand Central Terminal.

The three sentenced Thursday had been charged with air piracy and conspiracy to commit air piracy. None were convicted of charges connected with Murray's death.

Mark Vlasic, 29, Stamford, Conn., who plea-bargained his case Mar. 4, received a 30-year sentence with the provision the parole board can consider his release at any time. Petar Matanic, 31, Yonkers, N.Y., and Frane Pesut, 25, Fairview, N.J., are not eligible for release until they have served one-third of their sentence, or 10 years.

They were convicted along with the Basics on May 5.

Police raid uncovers blackout booty stash

NEW YORK (AP) — Acting on a telephone call from an anonymous caller, police raided an abandoned apartment building in upper Manhattan and recovered more than \$100,000 worth of booty stolen during last week's blackout.

Five persons were arrested as they tried to flee the building Wednesday, but three others escaped when they jumped through a window and evaded police in a chase through several nearby vacant buildings.

Police said those in custody were fences, purchasing goods from looters for resale.
